A boil water advisory issued for customers in portions of Pennsylvania American Water's Allegheny and Washington County service areas

McMurray, Pa. (February 7, 2026) Pennsylvania American Water routinely monitors its distribution system. Early this morning, a power surge caused a depletion of water storage at a tank near the Aldrich Water Treatment Plant in Elrama, Washington County, resulting in loss of positive pressure within our distribution system.

A loss of positive water pressure is a signal of the existence of conditions that could allow contamination to enter the distribution system through backflow by back pressure or back siphonage. As a result, we are issuing a boil water advisory for customers in the affected area.

This notice applies to approximately 95,000 customer connections in the following Pennsylvania American Water service areas in Washington and Allegheny Counties:

DO NOT DRINK THE WATER WITHOUT BOILING IT FIRST. Bring all water to a rolling boil, let it boil for one minute, and cool before using; or use bottled water. You should use boil or bottled water for drinking, making ice, washing dishes, brushing teeth and food preparation until further notice.

Inadequately treated water may contain disease-causing organisms. These organisms include bacteria, viruses and parasites, which can cause symptoms such as nausea, cramps, diarrhea and associated headaches.

These symptoms, however, are not caused only by organisms in drinking water, but also by other factors. If you experience any of these symptoms and they persist, you may want to seek medical advice.

Guardians of infants and young children and people at increased risk, such as pregnant women, some of the elderly, and people with severely compromised immune systems, should seek advice from their health care advisors about drinking this water. What happened? What is being done?

Normal electrical service has been restored. The company is also collecting and analyzing additional water quality samples, including bacterial samples.
