He also led the development of Blue Cross' innovative payment approach, called the Alternative Quality Contract, which rewards doctors and hospitals for delivering high-quality patient care and helping to keep members healthy. The model fosters shared responsibility for both improving care and moderating the increasing costs of health care. Dreyfus is also a founding member of the Massachusetts Coalition for Serious Illness Care, which brings together individuals and organizations committed to systematically improving care for serious illness. He has been a strong advocate for bipartisanship in improving the Affordable Care Act and working to stem the tide of opioid addiction. In addition, Dreyfus serves on a number of nonprofit boards, in service to the organizations and the community.

"It's an honor to receive this award from the Center for Collaborative Leadership," said Dreyfus. "Quality, affordable health care is possible in Massachusetts if the health care community continues to work together in a spirit of shared responsibility. There is still work to be done, and the key will be innovation and strong collaboration."

Past recipients of the Building a Better Boston Award include community activistMel King and Amy Latimer, president of TD Garden.
